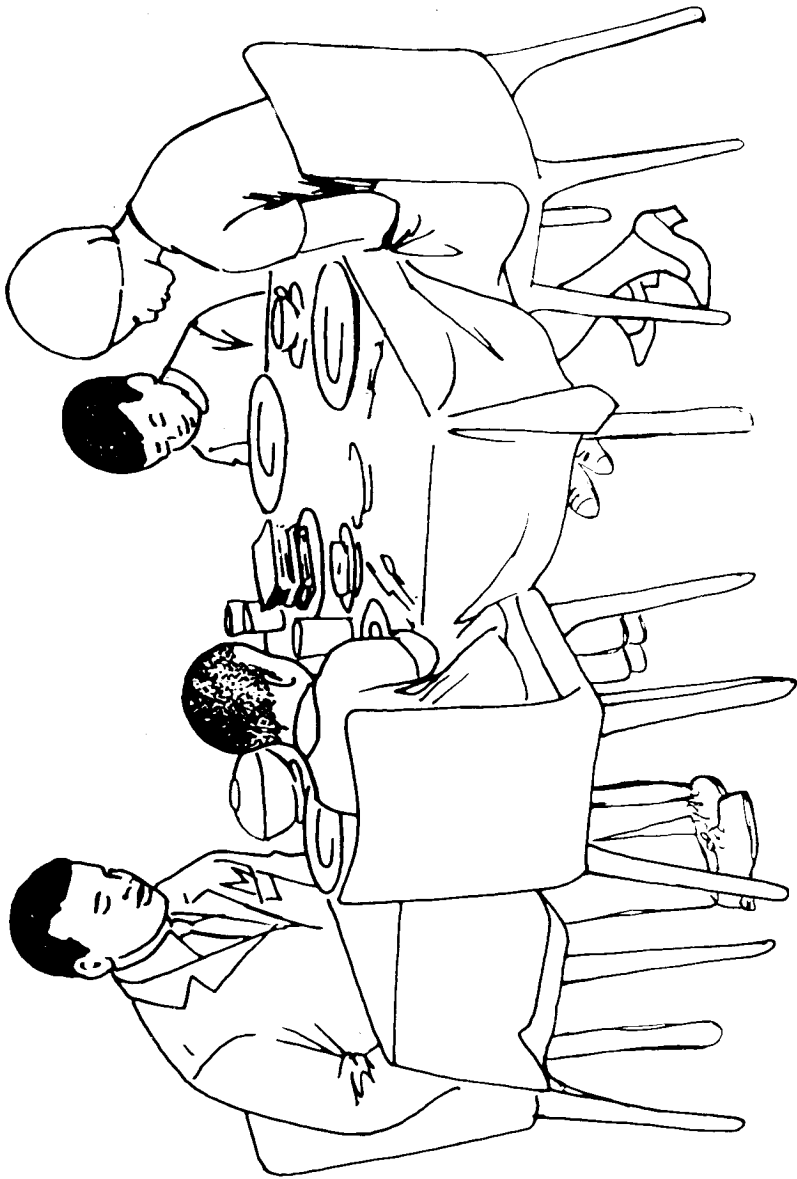

Everyone was very quiet. The mamas and fathers did not talk. The boys and girls were not playing. Even the small children were quiet.

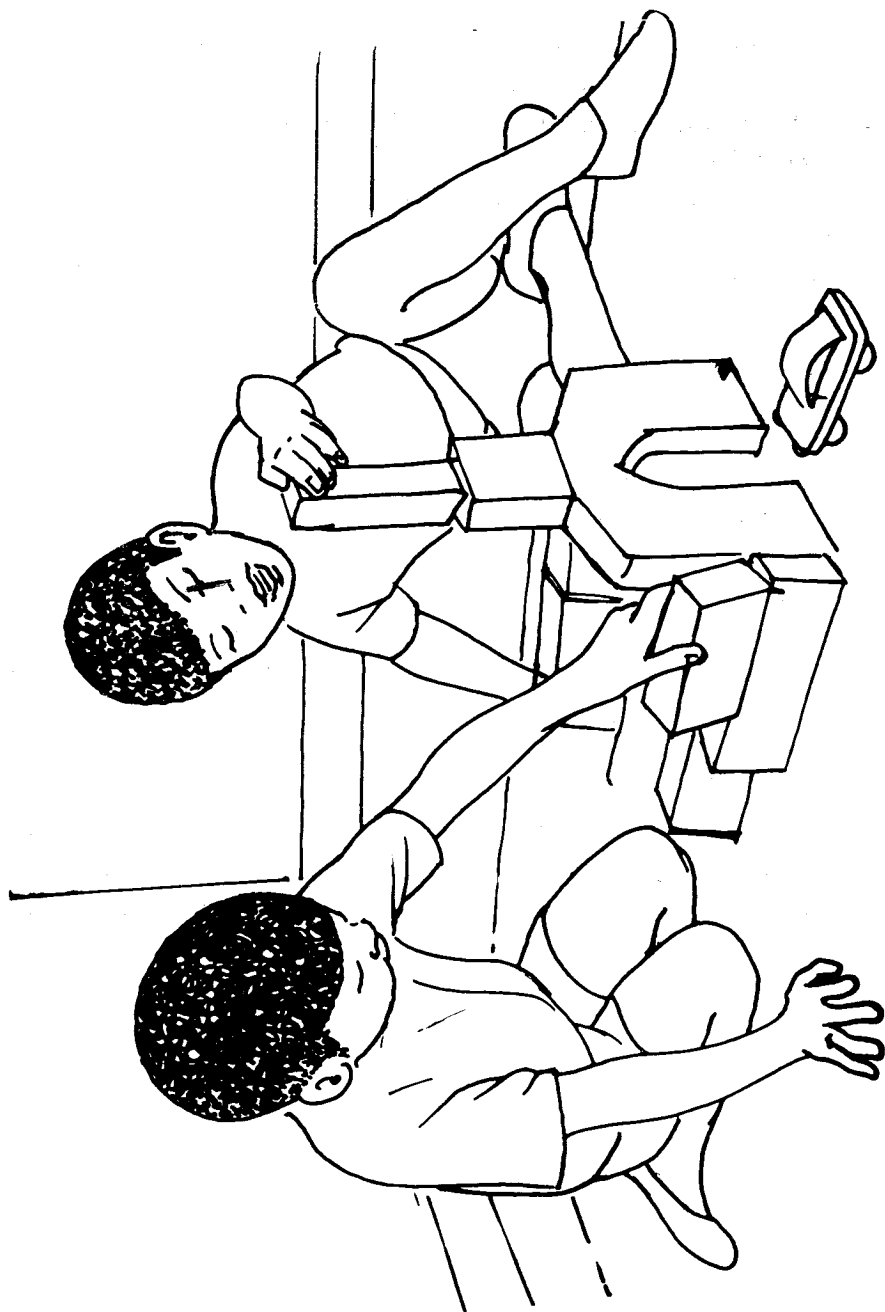

"What can we do?" Lot asked.

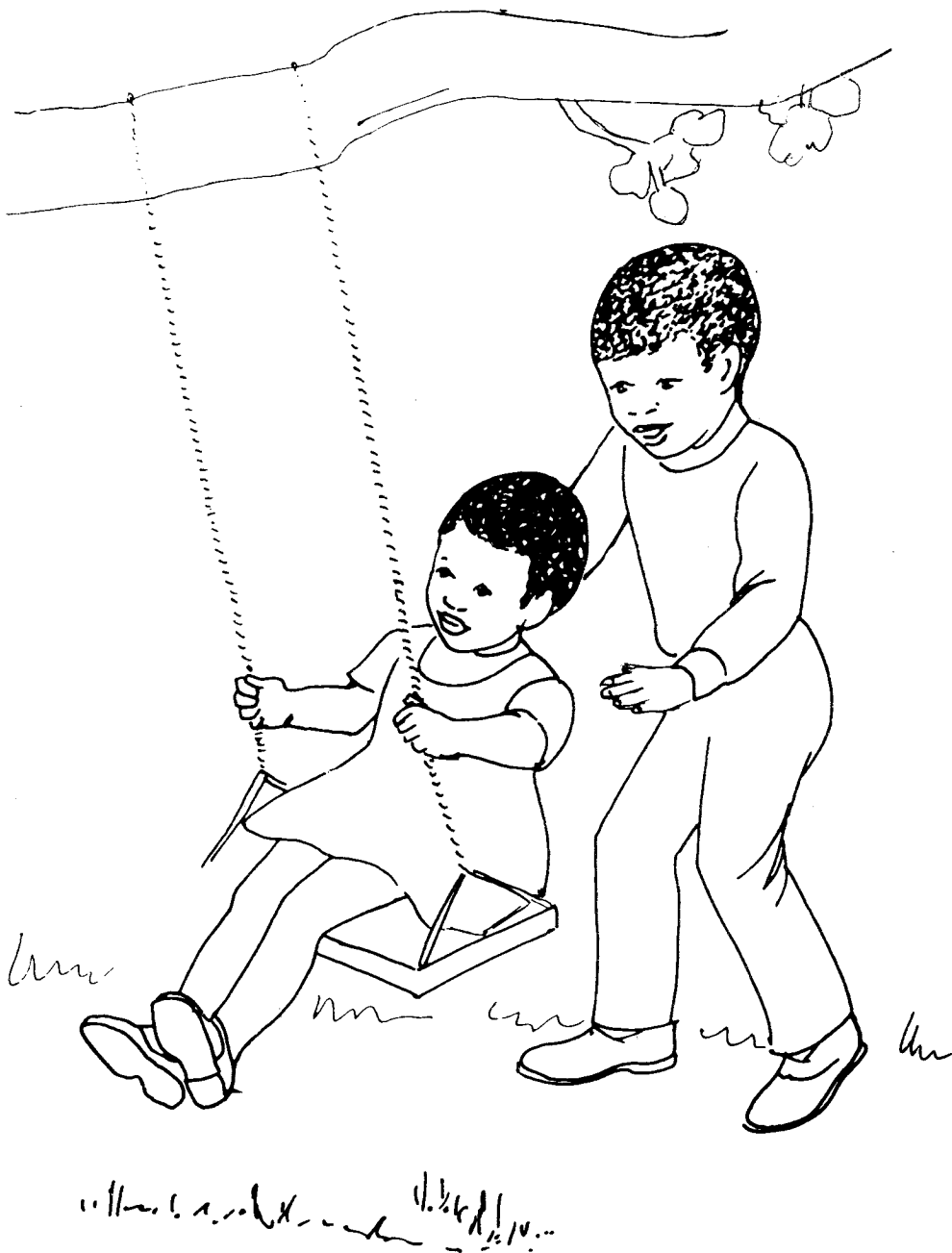
"Look at all the land," Abraham said. "You may choose the part you want. Your helpers will take your animals to that part. I will keep the part that is left."
